President's Report

Dear Mosman Rowers Members.

Dear Mosman Rowers Members,

Yet again we have faced a year of challenges with ongoing COVID restrictions, staffing shortages and uncertainty at different times. However, our fighting spirit has allowed us to thrive despite the challenges. We are most grateful, and thank every Member and our wider Community for all their support and generosity during our third year. We especially thank our Life Members, our Community Partner Sponsors, Harris Farm Markets, Di Jones Real Estate, and all those who volunteer and support our Club. This year we celebrated 110 years of the Rowers. Restrictions limited our plans, however we were able to hold a very special *In Conversation@The Rowers*. We heard from long time Member and local historian John Dansie, Steve Evans OAM, Olympic Rower from the Mosman Rowing Club and a Member of Rowers, whose family has had a very long and significant role in the Club, as champion rowers, together with Donna Braye, Mosman local studies librarian. They presented some of the history and stories of Mosman Rowers to the delight of many members and guests. Member Brian Hall, of Print Direction produced a wonderful commemorative calendar, capturing the rich heritage of the Club.

During the year to 31st March 2022 the Board and Club Management have focused on the following:

- > Complying with the terms and conditions of the Roads & Maritime Services (RMS) Agreement for Lease (AFL) and the Lease. Establishing systems for compliance with the Independent Liquor & Gaming Authority (ILGA) license requirements and the Registered Clubs Act.
- > Securing a long-term lease with Mosman Council. Structural improvements to the Clubhouse including upgrading the air conditioning.
- Continuing the work of our various committees and advisory groups to ensure focus on key strategic initiatives and sustainable programs at the Club.
- > Enhancing our member enagagement and communication.
- Working to drive membership growth.
- > Reviewing the annual events calendar to foster sporting, social and family events.

As at 31 March 2022 total membership was 1,118. During the period many members have joined and renewed, although we are finding it more difficult to encourage renewal and are actively working to achieve this. Due to the continuing impacts of COVID- 19 we again extended membership expiry dates, with Club closures limiting access to the Club, and we have reduced individual annual membership fees from \$99 to \$60. We are indebted to Julie Dalgliesh, a Life Member, who has dedicated countless hours to improving, managing and coordinating our membership program. Julie is working with Clubs NSW to ensure improvements but this has proven far more challenging than anticipated. A key focus continues to be ensuring we engage both our new and long-term Members so they are actively part of the Mosman Rowers community and culture. The Social and Membership Committee, convened by Linda Holub, has gone a long way to achieving this, supporting and initiating many activities. Working with the Bird & Bear Events team, we have re-established a very full weekly schedule of activities for members and guests including our ever popular weekly Meat raffle, health and fitness classes, community choir, mahjong and more; regular Trivia; our In Conversation@The Rowers series; the hugely popular monthly Jazz@The Rowers and our new and very successful, Art@TheRowers. Led by Gill Burke, this was a wonderful initiative. We warmly congratulate all the selected artists, and winners, in particular Michelle Arnott whose painting of Mosman Rowers was acquired and hangs in the Club in perpetuity. We plan to run the aquistive Art@TheRowers each year. We sincerely thank all who supported it, those who submitted their work; those who attended, admired and bought many of the works. We are especially grateful to our major sponsor Harris Farm Markets; our judge Ken Done, AM; the selection panel: Susan Baran, Kate Lovejoy-Furnell and James McKinlay with Social Committee and Board representatives; Damien Thompson, Neimad Picture Solutions for installing our professional track system, ArtSmart for discounted framing, and our small band of hard working volunteers who planned, managed and ran the exhibition. Without our volunteers the Club simply would not be a thriving community resource and we would not have had such a productive year.

In addition, our monthly newsletter, Rowers Reel, is produced by the Social Committee, with special

thanks to Steph O'Connor whose desktop publishing skills turns the content into our interesting newsletter, keeping members informed about all the offerings at the Club.

We are ofcourse, indebted and extremely grateful to our wonderful Rowers staff team. They have been our rock, consistently working hard through all the challenges to ensure the Club remains not just open but vibrant, ensuring all our Members and guests feel special and welcomed. Thanks to our staff, we not only enjoy breakfast, lunches, dinners, drinks and special occasions like birthdays and weddings, overlooking our beautiful Mosman Bay, we are also able to celebrate Christmas, Australia Day, ANZAC Day, Mothers Day and other key occasions like school holidays, the Melbourne Cup bringing together members, friends and family. We have been very pleased to be able to continue our Dining Differently@The Rowers series, and plan many more showcasing our suppliers and our talented chefs. I particularly want to acknowledge and thank our management team, led by our General Manager Sam Curtis and Shane Mansfield, Chief Operations Manager, Bird & Bear, and their team for all their hard work. Together they have overseen the ongoing successful development of the Club, despite all the difficulties of the period, ably supported by Emma & Adam Marshall, in our third year of trading under the 'new era'. The key challenge was of course ongoing COVID 19 closures for many months and restrictions on numbers and style of operations. The entire hospitality industry has faced the same challenges, key amongst these continues to be the severe shortage of skilled staff. This has been a very difficult period for staff who managed the process very professionally, returning to an energetic and fully engaged Club, but it has meant we are still unable to be open 7 days from early til late, but we are working towards this. We also gratefully acknowledge the strategic generosity of the Government in providing significant support and grants that were crucial during this period, keeping the Club open and our staff employed.

I also want to reiterate my personal thanks to the commitment, focus, support and hard work of all our Board members, each and every one has dedicated and invested significant time, energy and resources into the Club, continuing with regular meetings, supporting each and every committee and our staff. Working to achieve our goals and to remain viable requires many, many hours of volunteer work. Few understand just how many hours this requires. The Board has continued working hard to achieve our vision of establishing the Mosman Rowers as THE key Community hub in the Mosman area. Our Grant strategy and submissions continue with several successful grants during the year including the replacement of our air conditioning and receiving funds through the State government for a solar system, due to be installed later this year.

We continue working with and enjoying the strong support of the Mosman Council to enhance our Club and Mosman Bay, and reducing our impact on the environment. This has included being partners with Council in a trial on recycling organic waste and recycling takeaway coffee cups. Meantime we have moved to 100% paper takeaway coffee cups, and promoting the use of reusable coffee cups. We have supported several local charity groups with fundraising functions and have hosted community forums.

Finally, the Board offers its warmest congratulations to our fellow Board Member, Tim James, on his election as the Member for Willoughby. In this capacity Tim had to resign from our Board. On behalf of the members of Mosman Rowers, we sincerely thank Tim for his huge efforts in getting the Club back on its feet after going into Administration in 2018.

Clubs are important avenues for people to come together, to feel welcome, to feel safe and to feel a sense of belonging. We hope the Mosman Rowers is a place where everyone experiences these qualities.

Thank you once again for being a member of our fabulous Club, and we look forward to seeing you all at the Club again soon.

During the year many new members have joined and many have renewed, although we are finding it more difficult to encourage renewal and are actively working to achieve this. With several prolonged closures due to COVID-19 we extended hundreds of membership expiry dates to compensate members, and reduced individual annual membership from \$99 to \$60. The Social and Membership Committee has been working hard to ensuring better communication via the newsletter, and engagement of our members with regular activities, offered at discounted prices to members. We are indebted to Julie Dalgliesh, a Life Member, dedicating countless hours to improving, managing and coordinating our membership program. Julie is working with Clubs NSW to ensure improvements but this has proven more challenging and complicated than anticipated. We want to make it easier for our members to join and renew. Like all technological projects there are inevitable hiccups along the way, and we thank our members for their patience. We continue to work on plans to evolve the system and its integration into marketing, point of sale and other programs to enable us to better communicate with all our members via newsletter, emails and ensure we understand everyone's needs ,and providing the best member experience.

Annual membership fees are essential to cover the Club's member and corporate costs, such as insurances in addition to funding special projects such as equipment purchases, supporting sporting and social activities, and essential repairs to name just a few.

We planned to build these activities, however Covid and an extended wet sumer has severely interrupted these plans.

Risk & Compliance Report

The Risk & Compliance Advisory Committee (RCAC) made very significant advancements during 2021.

The RCAC was convened by Jeff Dalgliesh with Jules Dalgliesh as minutes secretary, until April 28th, 2021, with 2 MRC Board Directors, Ashdown representatives as well as MRC member volunteers.

The RCAC covers all aspects of the Mosman Rowers Club, with the key areas covering:

- Liquor Act and other statutory requirements of The Independent Liquor & Gaming Authority
- Registered Clubs Act
- Transport NSW (previously Roads and Maritime Services)
- Occupational Health and Safety

Since May, 2021 the RCAC has not met. The MRC is however up to date with its risk and compliance requirements. These matters are now dealt with by the Operations Committee and as necessary, by the Building Maintenance committee. In particular we thank Board Member Marlon Freeman who has made a significant contribution to overseeing these critical developments.

This incudes:

- · First aid training for staff and volunteers
- All aspects of food safety
- Work Place Inspections
- Cash Handling
- Covid 19 Public Health Orders
- Fire and Emergency
- Review of Mosman Council and RMS lease agreements
- Review of Mosman Rowers insurance policies
- Fire and safety requirements.
- Incident log and report maintenance
- Complaints Handling
- Maintain and react to Bird & Bear monthly venue audit checklist

In addition we have a Compliance Checklist and spreadsheet covering the Standard Operating Procedures, and all above.

Building Report

Another year has passed and while our much loved Clubhouse has not got any younger, it surprisingly was able to withstand the unseasonably high torrential rainfall with only a few minor leaks. However like all old buildings repairs and maintenance continue to be a burden. Fortunately, we continued to have success with securing Government grants, thanks to Robyn Bushell, and were able to complete the much needed overhaul of the sewerage and septic systems.

We have also received a grant for solar energy and a review is being conducted in the hope we can install panels to help with our energy consumption.

A lighting review and replacement of old and redundant light globes have been replaced with new LED bulbs. While this change is practical it will also translate in some significant energy savings going forward.

Blinds are to be installed in various locations in the club to help with some of the issues with associated with the morning and afternoon sun in both the Café and Bar areas.

We still have a few carry over items on our "to do" list which includes,


- The rubbish bin area,
- A gallery door to help minimise noise,
- Further aircon upgrades,

- Accessible access.

The big-ticket items for the next 12 months are the piles under the building, which are a requirement for our Maritime lease, and the upgrade of the kitchen floor. These works will be completed at the same time and once scheduled, will result in disruptions to our business hours with the strong likelihood of a short term closure.

The building committee is always open to any members that can help by either providing services or guidance as we move forward with our plans.

Grants Report

During 2021 and 2022 numerous relevant grants were identified with several applications submitted. During this time we utilised grant funds to upgrade the sewerage system and our air-conditioning. We have also received funds to install solar panels during 2022.

We acknowledge and are most grateful for the support of both Ms Felicity Wilson, MP, State Member for North Shore for funds through the NSW Community Building Program, and to Ms Zali Stegall OAM, MP, Federal Member for Warringah.

We continue to apply for State and Federal funds for maintenance work on piling supporting the building; upgrading bathrooms and improving accessibility including lift access to the lower level.

We also have applied for support from Mosman Council to ensure the Club is environmentally responsible. This includes keeping food waste out of landfill, moving away from use of single use food and drink containers, especially coffee cups and plastics and beautifying the approach to Club, in particular the waste storage and delivery areas.

Directors' Report

The Directors have pleasure in presenting the Financial Reports of Mosman Rowers Limited (the Club) for the period ended March 31st, 2022, and the Auditor's Report thereon.

We are pleased with the result for the year, being an operating profit of \$380,629 (\$447,229 for 2021), which includes a fee of \$50,000, being part of a Licence fee to manage the retail operations of the Club, Government Grants of \$49,073 and Government financial help re COVID of \$191,637.

Notes to Accounts

1. Company limited by guarantee

The Club is a Company limited by guarantee under the *Corporations Act 2001*. The amount of Capital which is capable of being called up in the event of, and only for the purpose of, a winding up of the Club, is not to exceed \$10 per Member by virtue of the Club's Constitution.

2. Statement of significant accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

a) Basis of preparation

The Financial Report is a general-purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards and the Corporations Act 2001.

It has been prepared on the basis of historical costs and except where stated, does not take into account changing money values or current valuations of non-current assets.

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and the realization of assets and liabilities in the ordinary course of business. The going concern of the Club is dependent upon it maintaining sufficient funds for its operations and commitments. The Club made a profit of \$380,629 during the period ending 31 March, 2022, and the Directors are very pleased with this result given the difficult trading conditions during COVID-19. They have been conservative in the cash forecast for the next 12 months because of continuing uncertain economic conditions, however, the Directors believe that the Club will be able to continue as a going concern and as a result the financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

b) Statement of compliance

The Financial Report has been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards (AASBs) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).

c) Cash and cash equivalents

For statement of cash flows and balance sheet presentation purposes, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand.

d) Revenue recognition

Sales revenue

Sales revenue is recognised when the goods are provided, or when the fee in respect of services provided is receivable.

Subscriptions/Memberships

Subscription revenue is recognised in the period to which the membership relates.

Grant income

Grant revenue is recognised in the income statement when the entity receives the grant or when it is probable that the entity will receive the economic benefits of the grant and the amount can be reliably measured.

If the grant has conditions attached which must be satisfied before the entity is eligible to receive the grant, the recognition of the revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Where the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value back to the grant contributor, the transaction is considered a reciprocal transaction and the revenue is recognised as a liability in the balance sheet until the required service has been completed, otherwise the income is recognised on receipt.

Donations income

Donation income is recognised upon receipt of the donated monies.

Licence fees

Under the terms of the agreement the Club entered into with Ashdown (Archie Bear) Pty Limited in April 2019 there was a payment received for the sum of \$500,000 which was applied toward the costs associated with the new fit-out to the Club's premises. In accordance with Australian Accounting Standard AASB 15 - 'Revenue from Contracts with Customers' - the payment of this sum has been treated as the creation of a performance obligation. As the amount is non-refundable and the term of the agreement is for 10 years, then in accordance with the requirements of the Standard the revenue derived from the performance obligation will be recognised over the full term. The adoption of AASB 15 has resulted in a change in the treatment of the Deferred Revenue amount on the Balance Sheet. In the year ending 31 March 2019 the full amount of \$500,000 was shown as a Current Liability. With the change of accounting treatment only the revenue to be recognised in the 12 month period ended 31 March 2022 is treated as a Current Liability and the balance has been transferred to a Non-Current Liability account.

e) Income tax

No provision for income tax is necessary in respect of Club trading and investment income because the income is exempt from tax under the relevant provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

f) Property, plant and equipment

Depreciation

Items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives. Assets are depreciated from the date of acquisition.

g) Employee benefits

- Liabilities for wages, salaries and annual leave are recognised for employee benefits in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled, plus related on-costs.
- ii. The liability for long service leave expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date is recognised and measured in accordance with (i) above.

The liability for long service leave expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date is recognised but is measured based on remuneration rates current as at balance date for all employees and based on the probability of each of them achieving ten years of service.

The directors believe that this method provides an estimate of the liability that is not materially different from the estimate that would be obtained by using the present value basis of measurement.

iii. Contributions are made by the Club to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

h) Inventories

Inventories consisting of house supplies are carried at cost.

i) Goods and services tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable from or payable to the ATO is included as a current asset or liability in the balance sheet.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis.

Operating lease commitments

At balance date the Company had an Agreement for Lease with Transport for NSW. The Australian Accounting Standard AASB 16 - Leases - requires leases to be recorded on the Balance Sheet as non-current Right of Use assets (ROU) with an associated liability separated into current and non-current components. However, the Agreement for Lease is short-term and the Standard gives the lessee the choice of whether to recognise short-term leases on the Balance Sheet. The Club has elected to apply the short-term lease exemption to the Agreement for Maritime lease.

10. Segment Reporting

The Club operates in Australia providing Club facilities for the recreation of its Members including a continuous water-based activity.

11. Subsequent Reporting

There are no events of a material and unusual nature likely, in the opinion of the Directors, to affect significantly the operations of the Club, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Club in subsequent financial years not otherwise disclosed in this report or the financial statements.

12. Non-Current Liabilities

During the year, the directors agreed to recognise a Top Up Loan from Ashdown of \$210,000, having been provided to fund additional asset improvements, and have allowed an amount of Interest of \$36,478 to 31 March,2022. The parties are still in dispute as to the final amount, which the Directors consider is not material
